

Success in amateur dramatics, like similar organisations, depends wholly on team work, both on and back stage.

Times and days of this programme vary and you may have to search to find it.

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
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The recent monsoons have wreaked havoc with human affairs, but so far, the natural world does not seem to have been too badly affected or inconvenienced. In spite of the very late spring, most things seem to have caught up surprisingly well.

The trees are now green over the beautiful green only seen
in springtime. The swifts,
swallows and martins have rejoined us from Africa; the
early butterflies are out and
egg laying, and the fields
are dotted with daisies, dandelions and buttercups. The
next plant arrivals should be
the Kingcups or Marsh Marigolds
in the damp meadows.

The bluebells are out, filling the woods with their heavy sweet fragrance. Feeding from them, and simultaneously pollinating them, are many wild bees and flies. The solitary bees, of which there are hundreds of species, probably visit more flowers than the more familiar bumble and hive bees. They build no nest, but make a series of cells which are stocked with pollen to provide a store of food for the single larva which develops in each cell. The commonest family of solitary bees is Andrena, and a species of this genus regularly excavates vertical burrows in dry ground. Locally, it is common on parts of the paths in Gillfield Wood, and may be observed with perfect safety since its sting is incapable of penetrating human skin. The burrows may be up to a foot deep and are excavated by biting the earth away with the bee's jaws. The female is an attractive furry orange, and the male somewhat darker. Of the flies which visit bluebells at this time of year, one

of the commonest is Khingia Campestris (it has no common namet) As you can see from the illustration, it is the possessor of an unusually large nose. This actually houses an extending "tongue" or proboscis which can reach deep into flowers with a long narrow tube. This fly belongs to the great group of hoverflies, many of which mimic bees and wasps. All the flies in this family are quite harmless however, having neither sting nor bite. Their larvae are amongst the most diverse in shape and habits amongst the whole insect kingdom. Some eat greenfly by the dozen, some devour bluebell and narcissus bulbs with great relish, some live in foul stagnant water and breathe through a periscope like tube, some live happily in the piles of cow and horse dung and yet others act as scavengers in the nests of bees. wasps and hornets. The adult flies are remarkable for their marvellous powers of flight and the ability to hover. This huge family of flies is vital for a great proportion of flower pollination and should be recognised as beneficial.

I fully realise that few people share my enthusiasm for this group of insects, but please don't judge them by those two household pests, the Common Housefly and the Bluebottle.

#### Pleasure and Profit

Those who attended the concert on May 11th, organised by a committee of Totley Rise Methodist Church as part of their efforts for the International Year of the Child, enjoyed a delightful musical evening. The Hoyle family (Roger, Margaret, 13-year-old Christopher and 11-year-old Elaine, of Chatsworth Road) showed their versatility in a

programme which consisted of string quartets, pinno trio, pismo duet and two outstanding cello solos by Emistogner. The children from Dore Junior School sang with enthusiasm and clarity in a suitably "international" programme which included a Jamaicam calyyso and Scottish, Lexican and Hung riam folk songs.

The evening realised 2135, and the Chairman, Ers Barbara Bullivant, J.P., commented that it was that as well as helping the valuable work done in our own area by the NSPCC and Parent Lifeline, some of this money would be helping children in some of the poorest areas in the world through Action in Distress. #### Aunt Mary's Cooking Tips

When you have bought those rather appetising croquette potatoes, do they disintegrate when you have deep fried them or are they a little too greasy? Try this method and they will turn out golden brown restaurant style; place foil on the bottom of a baking tin and at the same time melt a little butter in a dish. place the croquettes in rows on the foil and lightly brush them with the melted butter. Bake in a medium oven, turning from time to time for about 20 mins. You will find them crisp, firm, non-greasy and tasty.

Dear Madam.

STREET LIGHTING BASLOW ROAD, TOTLEY

Your letter dated the 26th February. 1979, addressed to County Counciller Brookes, has been investigated and the facts of the case are as follows:-

In December 1978, seven of the street lights in Baslow Road failed through a fault on the Yorkshire Electricity Board's supply cable. This fault was reported to the V.E.B. who have since then, repeatedly attempted to locate the fault. Difficulties however have been experienced through the fault being intermittent and their investigations are still continuing.

Consequently, the lamps in question have been left permanently lit in an attempt to force the fault to become apparent and I trust that the problem will be resolved in the near future.

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
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

Trophy for 366 squadron

Sheffield's 366 (King Ecgbert) Air Training Corps Squadron has won the intermediate trophy in the South Yorkshire Wing ATC athletics competition, and was placed in three other categories. Ashley Frost, one of the squadron's ex-cadet flight sergeants, has been commissioned as a pilot officer and is now training to be a pilot at RAF Cranwell.

#### Rowan school

In June 1976 Wiss Margaret Harvey brought her staff and pupils from old buildings near the centre of Sheffield to a new specially designed school in Furniss Avenue, Dore. At that time the Rowan was a

primary school for mentally handicapped children drawn from many parts of the city. The school still has some of its original pupils but its role is changing now to take children who have specific learning difficulties. These children are referred to the rowan from other schools so that they can be given specialised help, and stay for short periods - anything from one term to two years - before moving on to other schools. Some of the pupils have handicaps such as epilepsy, mongolism, emotional retardation and social deprivation. A feature of the school is its Communication Unit staffed by speech therapists and teachers.

As well as covering the basic skills of literacy and numeracy, the staff try to give the children the same educational and social opportunities as they would be likely to get in any other primary school in sheffield. Because they feel it will be a valuable and enjoyable experience, the staff are taking a group of juniors on an outdoor activities holiday in North Wales during the Whit half-term break. In July the whole school will be involved in an environmental studies week based at the Whiteley Woods Girl Guides Centre. Many of the staff and children will be staying there for the week and others will be bussed out day by day to work in and around the area.

In order to raise money for these ventures, the staff, governors and parents are holding a Summer Fair at the school on Saturday June 23rd starting at 2 pm. There will be many attractions - sideshows, stalls, displays etc., and local firms, shops, theatres, cinemas and restaurants have been very generous in donating prizes and goods for sale at the fair. The Rowan School is hoping that the public will be equally generous in its support.
