A drawing of this cottage appeared on the front cover of our December 1979 and 1994 issues but here is a photo, taken by Bob Warburton and donated by his wife at our recent scanning day. Other photos from Bob's collection will shortly appear on the Totley History Group website www.totleyhistork.org.uk.

The cottage stood on Totley Hall Lane just below the Fleur de Lys and was lived in by the Ward family for many years before being demolished in 1978. The wall leading up on the right bounds the road nowadays called Stocks Green Drive – the original well, built into the garden wall, is almost lost in the shadows in the bottom right corner of this photo. The well was moved and later re-built on the new estate.

The small flat roofed building to the left was the kitchen and coal-house, further to the left was the outside toilet. The cottage had quite a large garden across the front and to the right hand side with a path down the middle. To the rear of the cottage was a spring which came out of the fields at the back and very rarely did it dry up in summer. The cottage only ever had gas lighting.

Ward Forum

The Ward Forum for Dore and Totley, which includes Whirlow and most of Bradway, convened on two occasions over the summer. Both were held at Totley library. The first, on Thursday 5th August, was arranged at short notice to discuss the South Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive's "Bus Vision" consultation. Over 30 people attended, including many from Bradway who expressed concern at the apparent suggestion that the 25/25A service be replaced by a new service bypassing important local facilities at Greenhill, as well as being less convenient for accessing the city centre. With regard to possible improvements to public transport services, various suggestions were made such as the provision of cycle lockers at Dore station (see below) and a better orbital bus service between Meadowhead and Whirlow via Dore station to improve links to existing cross-border bus and train services. Those attending were encouraged to make their views known to the SYPTA before the consultation period ended on 3rd September. It has since been clarified by the SYPTA that no bus route changes in the area are imminent, but the concerns expressed have been noted.

The second meeting was on Wednesday 8th September. In reviewing issues that had been raised at previous meetings, particular concerns were expressed about speeding traffic, with calls for greater police control and signage on Baslow Road and for early consideration by the Community Assembly of the introduction of 20mph speed limits within residential areas. It was noted that the priority highway scheme for the year was the construction of a pedestrian refuge near The Glen nursing home to help people cross Abbeydale Road South. However, the increased cost of this scheme would mean having to defer the construction of the missing section of footway along Totley Brook Road. There was continued disquiet about the proposal to site new allotments at Mickley Lane, but this was not discussed in detail as a separate meeting had been arranged. Proposals for the play area in Greenoak Park were outlined, but various other issues remain to be addressed. Concerns were expressed about the revised arrangements for re-cycling, especially the ability of elderly people to move the blue boxes, but Councillor Ross urged people to give it a fair trial. Apparently, elsewhere in the city, problems had not been as bad as people feared. There was still no progress to report on applications by the Dore Village Society to secure Village Green status for three sites, although Councillor Ross assured those present that things were happening behind the scenes.

New concerns that were raised included:

- the need for a litter bin at the new bus terminus
- further issues to do with Greenoak Park (provision of warden service, availability of toilets, etc.)
- the possibility of providing cycle racks in Dore village and cycle lockers at Dore station.

Various other suggestions were discounted following discussion.

The next Forum will be held at Bradway Primary School, Bradway Drive on Tuesday 30th November (7.30pm). As the Ward Forum will have been in existence for a year by then, there will be an opportunity to review progress to date and consider any changes that might be necessary.

SHEFFIELD CATS SHELTER

Could you provide some Christmas cheer for this Charity?

With Christmas approaching, many people think about donating to a charity, and there are so many deserving causes, it's difficult to choose. But, if you are an animal lover, how about supporting a local charity that is in desperate need of help?

The Sheffield Cats Shelter is one of the oldest charities in the UK. It was set up in 1897 by the caring daughter of a local industrialist, who could not bear to see local animals suffering.

Since then, the Shelter has continued with this good work. These days it promotes responsible pet ownership and helps to find loving homes for some of the many cats in Sheffield that, for some reason, do not have somebody to look after them. The staff and trustees work tirelessly to look after the cats they care for. They never put a healthy cat to sleep; all the cats that come into their care are seen by a vet, are given the appropriate vaccinations and medicines and are neutered and micro-chipped. When they are ready, they are homed as soon as a suitable place can be found.

The shelter is always full to capacity and the staff pride themselves on finding homes for the many older cats that come into their care, often because their owners have passed way or have had to go into care themselves.

The Shelter is wholly dependent on contributions from supporters and monies received through legacies; it receives no state or lottery help. Although the charity has managed to keep afloat during these difficult economic times, it is now in desperate need of funds. Last winter, money had to be spent on major repairs to the premises to ensure the building survived. This was a massive drain on resources and has left the charity with a deficit this year.

So, if you would like to bring some Christmas cheer to this deserving cause, there are several ways you could help.

For a few pounds a month, you could become a sponsor. For that, you will receive a regular newsletter and get a warm fuzzy feeling that you are helping homeless animals. Or you might want to make a one-off donation.

With Christmas on the horizon, how about buying some Christmas cards from the Shelter or one of their branded goods as stocking filler? These, as well as raffle tickets for their Christmas draw are available from the Shelter.

If you prefer, why not donate some cat food? This is always welcome and the staff are particularly grateful for the "senior" food that is available in most pet shops and supermarkets.

I was delighted to read the tribute to Stan Bingham for the hard work and commitment that he put into the development and recreation of the Pinfold which had gone wild.

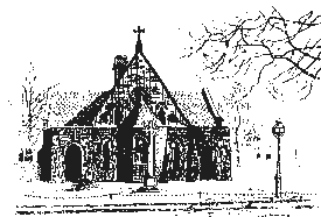
I knew Stan and his brother for many years and he pointed out to me where I could plant 2 trees dedicated to my late wife Joan who passed away in January 1985.

Another year has passed since I last reported to the **Independent**. I still visit the horses at Totley Bents each weekend to hand round a few carrots and apples.

Peggy, the powerful bay mare, and George, a fine chestnut gelding are first on the list as they graze adjacent to the stables opposite the Cricket Inn. Inside the stables Max, a piebald pony, Ollie, a palomino pony, Aran the sturdy grey gelding, and Susie a grey and white pony recently arrived are about to be ridden by the young girls who also help out with the chores. I leave a share of the fare for the horses to eat when they return.

Then on to Strawberry Lee Lane where Punch, Banjo, another piebald pony and Sunny 1, a fair-skinned palomino gelding, are at lunch tucking into buckets of food just put out for them by Punch's owner. I leave a few apples and carrots for them to consume when they have eaten their main lunch. Punch, a tall, grey gelding is well into his forties but seems to be in good health. He is now my favourite since the departure of Milly last year.

I move on to the top of Moss Road where three horses are to be found, Capri, a brown bay mare, Sunny 2, a palomino gelding and Anna, a piebald mare. Teresa tells me that Capri is expecting a foal in March or April.

Now on to the fields off Baslow Road to find Mojito, a fair-shinned bay youngster, Carl, a brown skewbald youngster, and William a palomino youngster. Together they consume the last of the fare. Then it's back home.

I passed my 79th birthday in October but, despite beginning to feel the effects of my age, I still enjoy my weekly visits to the horses.

Farming Scene

Our Dorset ewes are now housed at the farmstead ready to start lambing shortly. By the time you read this I will be doing my normal 18 hours, 7 days a week, maternity shifts. I have been known to do a straight 42 hour shift when a number of ewes have kept me up all night!! As I get older I find it harder to continually go to bed at midnight and be up again at 5 or 6am to give whatever assistance is required to optimise the number of lambs born alive and successfully reared. Most ewes appreciate a little bit of help to ease the passage of their lambs during birth. It may be just a case of a bit of a tug on the front legs, combined with the mother's final "big push" to shorten the time in labour. Sometimes 2 lambs enter the birth canal together and become stuck. In these cases one of the lambs has to be pushed back into the uterus so the other one can bypass it on its way into the world.

On occasion a lamb is presented bum first. In these cases it has to be helped back into the womb, the back legs carefully manipulated from underneath it until they are in a position whereby the lamb can be pulled out backwards. This is a dangerous operation for both the ewe and the lamb. It is very easy to tear the uterus wall when trying to ease the lambs back legs from under it, causing the ewe to die. Lambs are naturally born head/front legs first which eases the passage and helps preclude the inhalation of fluids during the birth. A back legs first birth gives a harder, less streamlined passage and because of the action of cervical pressure on the rib cage almost always causes the lamb to inhale fluid on the way out. This is nearly always fatal to the lamb. The survival trick is to get the back legs/tail/bum all lined up nicely and then pull the lamb out in one very quick action whilst having one hand free to tourniquet its neck to stop it breathing in fluid on emergence. 9 times out of 10 this method is successful and the lamb survives albeit with a bit of help to get it breathing properly.

The biggest challenge is a breach birth where only the back of the lamb is facing in the right direction. Here the lamb has to be manipulated until either a forwards or backwards birth is possible. The worst case scenario is a breach presentation where the lamb is also upside down! Much turning and twisting is required to ensure that the legs, back or front, are facing the same way as the ewes legs rather than by the tail. This ensures that the lamb's natural body flexibility follows the curvature of the ewe's birth canal. This may sound relatively straightforward but can take upwards of half an hour to complete and leave the "midwife" pretty much exhausted.

Remember, while this remedial work is in progress, the ewe is doing her damndest to push this intrusive arm as well as the lamb, out as hard as she can. And they can. She may even be desperately trying to jump up and run away as well during this delicate operation! After you have spent as much time and effort to get the lamb born alive, it is quite possible that the ewe, particularly if she is a first timer, will ignore the lamb totally. It is important that immediately the lamb is born that it is placed near the ewe's nose and some of the faecal fluid and slime is rubbed onto her nose so that she begins to recognise that it belongs to her. Smell is the nethold that sheep use to identify one another so a ewe recognises the smell of her lamb first. The placing of the fluid on her nose also stimulates the natural response of licking all the rest of the foetal membranes off the lamb, thereby stimulating it into life whilst drying it off so that it does not get cold. Quite often at this point the lamb will give a series of quite desperate sounding baa's which roughly translated say "Mum, what's happened to me, I need help". To which the ewe will reply "It's OK I'm here, stay by me and you will be alright". Sounds quite familiar doesn't it! At that point you know that for now at least they have bonded, and should be able to look after themselves on their own for a while. Until that is the lamb decides it cannot find its mother's teats and the midwife has to step in once again to try to solve the problem.

It is a real pleasure to see 2 or 3 sets of twins that have born overnight happily walking round with their Mothers having been successfully delivered, bonded and found the milk supply on my early morning inspection. This is often not the case. I am met by lambs that have been born dead, mothers struggling to deliver their offspring or 2 mothers trying to foster another ewe's lambs. How would they cope if I was not there to look after them I wonder? Many ewes and lambs would not survive the delivery/post natal traumas. But then this is what shepherding is all about. Reducing the losses and maximising the number of lambs successfully born and reared.

This is all down to long hours, hard work, skilled midwifery and good husbandry. The satisfaction comes from seeing ewes and lambs, happy, contented, looking and doing well.

The sweet was a delightful panna cotta with orange caramel followed by coffee and petit fours of chocolate brownie, blueberry cheesecake, and truffles

The chef, Alan Rigby, and his enthusiastic young team, were congratulated by everyone for their wonderfully cooked and presented meal. Both owners and staff were very welcoming and attentive to everyone's needs throughout the evening and we certainly enjoyed the food experience at the Cross Scythes.

The full Christmas Menu is available from 1st Dec priced at £19.95, but I'm afraid if you wanted to book for Christmas day it is now fully booked. The Cross has been recently voted Best Leased Pub of The Year and now has 4* AA rating, so don't forget if you have a full house over the holiday, there may be some rooms available at the Cross Scythes.

Burgess Family

I don't know whether you have had any response regarding the Burgess family (*July 2010 issue*), if not perhaps this might help.

In 1891 Albert Fox age 35, general labourer, lived at Totley Bents with his wife Hanna (Taylor) of Dore, age 33 and his children Maurice 14, John 12, Rose 8, Kate 4, and Marriot 2.

In the twenties John, Jack as he was known, lived in a little hut on the tip at the corner of Hillfoot Road and Penny Lane. He cobbled shoes and went round the village gathering them and returning them after mending.

Now, Ida Burgess was my chief bridesmaid when I got married in 1936, and I got to know the family very well. According to my notes at the time, (I was already involved in 'family trees'), Kate Fox married Joseph Burgess a farmer at the Bents, and they had Kate, Rose, Ida, Dinah and Joseph, Joe who still lives in Totley I believe.

One of the sisters married a man called Wortley but I don't know which Wortley, as there were two suicides in Totley around that time, Joe in Shewsbury Terrace, and the other at the far end of summer Lane, the last house before the allotments, or it could have been another Wortley whom I didn't know. Whoever it was they had a daughter Winnie, (Ida's cousin and in 1934 when Totley was taken into Sheffield, and Seargent Bagshaw left the Police Station, Mrs Wortley and Winnie moved into the police house. There could possibly have been someone else with them, I never heard anything about them from Ida - nor that she ever visited them. I got married in 1936, and Ida left Totley with the family for whom she worked. Incidentally, I often went with Ida to Lower Bents Farm to visit her Grandmother whose name I believe was Taylor before she married. Confusing?, I agree.

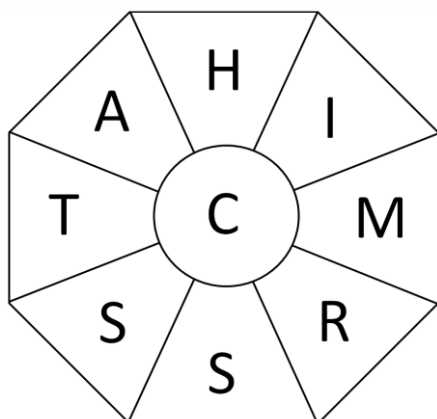

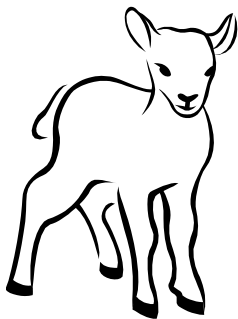

GARDENING TIPS FOR DEC/JAN

It's happened, yes, the scientists have said what we have been saying for years, if you talk to your plants they perform better. I'm convinced that Aaron and many others used to talk or sing to their plants especially when you see their efforts at the Totley show. I was saying to my orchids only yesterday (they were misbehaving a bit bending over when they should be upright) that they were beautiful and thanked them for flowering continuously for 18 months. It was then I noticed another shoot peeping out below a leaf, so you see, that confirms what some of us gardeners have known for years they do appreciate us treating them with a bit of intelligence and it pays dividends. The men in white coats have not been round of late so I think it's ok to carry on conversing with them. One advantage also is they don't answer back when I tick them off for being naughty. The rain is not helping us whip up any enthusiasm to go in the garden, even though there is a lot of clearing up to do. I have not finished lining the greenhouses and tidying up the leaves on the lawn is an on-going task at this time of year. It doesn't do to let the leaves lay too long on the lawn, or the grass starts to go yellow and takes quite a while to recover. The goose is getting fat, so time to make your list for Father Christmas, I hope you include useful things like spades and hoes as well as gardening DVDs to increase your gardening skills. Much better than socks unless they are the type that go in wellies. I am hoping for a nice holiday in somewhere warm, though I am not holding my breath. I have just finished insulating the large greenhouse - one more to go. It's a messy operation as the insulation gets dusty and spidery when it's in store during the summer; we need to have hats and scarves on to stop any creepies dropping on us. I have checked over the heaters. I only use small ones just to keep the frost at bay; the paraffin is a bit expensive now so we have to decide which plants get priority. Sometimes it pays to buy new plants instead of trying to bring the old ones through the winter and using up expensive fuel.

I will be putting in onion seeds towards the end of the month - the traditional day is Boxing Day. The onion beds should be well on the way by the time you read this; I have to dig trenches about 18 inches deep and layer the bottom with old bean stalks (this will give giant bulbs ha, ha) then a layer of compost and manure, then a dusting of bonemeal a small amount of potash and the lot topped with top soil. When the plants are ready in April they will be planted in this lovely bed they will not need to be fed during the growing season, and with a bit of luck will be ready to win at the Totley Show, and also have some juicy ones ready for the kitchen.

We have had a bumper crop of apples this year some are a bit scabby but ok when peeled, I try not to spray with insecticides this means we have some grubby ones also, but with so many we can afford to let the odd codling moth grub have one or two. I will have to give the trees a winter wash when we get a fine day during January or early February to keep the woolly aphids at bay. This gardening is one battle after another if it's not bugs its rain and if it's not rain its sun. It's a wonder we get anything growing at all we gardeners are gluttons for punishment, but it's very satisfying when everything or almost everything comes good.

Just keep persevering and as Alan Tichmarsh says enjoy your gardening.

FLOWERS

Check over dahlia tubers to ensure they are not rotting or drying up too much. Give them a dusting of flowers of sulphur after cutting out any suspect parts. Break away the dead foliage from gladioli corms prior to storing them away ready for planting out next spring. Begonia tubers should be checked to see that they are still healthy. Winter flowering iris (IRIS UNGUICULARIS with pale lilac flowers should now be coming into bloom. Not only does this plant give a bit of welcome colour in the garden but also supplies superb flowers for indoor decoration, provided they are cut when in bud. This iris flourishes best if planted close to a south-facing wall and then left to fend for itself, so you get splendid results for very little effort. When the soil has dried out (we hope) dig over any new beds, add a bit of bone meal or well-rotted compost (or both) leave the ground roughly dug so that old Jack Frost can do his stuff on the nasties. Cover cold frames which are over wintering plants with insulating material to protect from frost. Take root cuttings of phlox, verbasum and oriental poppies and root in containers placed indoors or under a frame. During any mild spells, perennials such as lupins and Michaelmas daisy can be planted out. Pot up Lilies and place in a name ready to set out in the spring. December is the last chance to plant out late tulips, also plant out alpenes and rock plants, and choose a mild day. Firm in any plants, which have been moved by frost or wind. Prune roses down to about half way, this makes the beds look tidier and does not harm the plants it also helps to reduce the plants rocking in the wind, they can be pruned fully in April.

VEGETABLES The thing to think about is to work with nature rather than against her. So keep off your

garden in wet conditions. Do however; press on with winter digging whenever conditions are favourable. It's also a good time to apply lime, if this is needed, ground chalk or limestone. Buy your seed potatoes early when there is plenty of choice and set the tubers to chit (sprout) in light frost free conditions. Remove yellowing leaves from brassicas; check over stored root crops for possible rotting. Prepare runner bean trench. If you are going to put onions in the "Totley Show", sow seeds on Boxing Day for the show, sow Kelseo or Robinsons mammoth, for the kitchen, Ailsa Craig or wait a bit later for the kitchen variety and put in onion sets turbo or sturon are good ones. Lin a few roots of mint, place them in a deep box of old compost, put them in a frame or greenhouse to give shoots for early picking.

Prepare the onion bed as soon as weather permits; dig in plenty of manure or well-rotted compost deeply. Spread bonfire ash liberally over the top also bonemeal and hoof and horn meal each at the rate of 4ozs (100g) per sq. yd. (mtr). Clear away any finished crops and prepare ground as above.

TREES SHRUBS and FRUIT

Now that deciduous species have lost their leaves you can check over the trees and bushes for dead or weak branches which need to be removed. Evergreens can also be pruned. You could use the prunings for Christmas decorations. Check all trees and shrubs for wind rock damage, also all stakes and supports have not worked loose and that ties have not become too tight around the stems. Spray trees and shrubs and especially fruit trees and bushes with winter tar oil wash; choose a fine calm day to avoid spray drifting. Complete the pruning of apples and pears, paint cut branches with arbrex or similar to prevent ingress of woolly aphids and disease.

Raspberries are difficult to weed by hand you could try selective weedkiller; it's very slow at this time but very effective. All fruit bushes will benefit from an early application of high potash fertiliser followed in the spring by an application of general fertiliser such as Growmore.

Firm in any newly planted stock. Inspect all grease bands and replace if necessary. Give evergreen trees a shake if they are covered with snow especially newly planted ones. Wrap up warm any vulnerable plants like azalea, rhododendrons with fine mesh netting or straw.

GREENHOUSE and INDOOR PLANTS Water sparingly and ensure plants in flower are kept moist and away from hot fires and radiators, increase humidity round indoor azaleas, cyclamens and winter cherries by standing on wet pebbles. Use insecticide pins to control aphids and whitefly

Paint patches of scale and mealy bug with fentricide or methylated spirits. Light is very important in the greenhouse now, glass should be washed particularly on the outside to remove residue of shading and grime. Vines under glass should be pruned. All side growths or laterals are cut back to two buds.

Fuchsias are now dormant need to be inspected and not allowed to dry out keep them just slightly moist. Cut back old geranium plants, shortening the growth to a joint or a bud 6 to 9 inches above the pots. Then re pot the plants shaking all the soil from the roots and repotting in the smallest pots into which the roots can be placed. Clean up inside the greenhouse; clean all pots and trays ready for seed planting. Make preparations for taking chrysanthemum cuttings. Give

freesias, which are coming into bloom a little weak liquid manure. Cyclamen seedlings should be potted on into 3 or 3½ inch pots. Remove flowers from azaleas as soon as they commence to fade and before seeds start to form. After your pots of daffodils and hyacinths finished flowering allow them to continue growing until the leaves die down. If you have been troubled by vine weevil (a little creamy white grub which eats plant roots) treat all pots in the greenhouse with PRAVADO it will also control other insects such as whitefly, greenfly etc.

LAWNS As usual at this time keep it clean, tidy and keep off during frosty weather.

GENERAL Nothing to stop you altering paths, painting garden furniture, cleaning pots, mending tools, taking mowers etc. for sharpening (it's cheaper just now). Recovering the shed roof, making a new compost heap, don't just sit there get cracking!! Well that's it for this year. I hope you have a lovely Christmas and a really great gardening New Year.

My Christmas 1940

I have a short account of how I was a fringe observer of the 2 major air raids on Sheffield in December 1940. At the time I lived with my parents and younger brother Peter in Mexborough, some 12 miles from Sheffield I usually cycled the 9 miles to my work at Hatfields in Tinsley though my old bike often let me down. That year Christmas Day fell on a Wednesday and on the 5th of December we were told our break would run from Tuesday lunch to Friday morning, somewhat shorter than usually happens these days.

I will not repeat my record of events in the middle of the month but leap frog forward to the 20th when we had a Christmas Dinner in the canteen at work. The cost was probably the same as when I started work there early in 1939. I had been told at interview I would be paid £1

per week. In fact I got £1.2.6, the extra half-crown (2/6) being for a 2 course lunch Monday to Friday, we only worked half day Saturday.

Monday 23rd and Tuesday 24th were the highlights of my Christmas. I recorded that we were given a 7.5% bonus plus an extra week's wage because we had worked during the usual "works week" holiday in the summer. For me this amounted to the princely sum of £7.16.0, most of which of course would go to my mother for "board and lodging". We were also given 150 Player cigarettes even though I didn't smoke. I worked out they had a value of 11/-. On Christmas Eve, as promised, we finished work at lunchtime. In the afternoon I put my new found wealth to some savings and bought a new Raleigh cycle for £7.12.6 plus 3/- for lamps. I noted it "had no fancy features and had previously cost £5.5.0!"

I think my Christmas Day may surprise readers or amuse and maybe amaze. From 7.30 am to 12 noon I was on Home Guard duty at work. Apparently that morning my Rotherham friend Ernest and his father came to our house to see me but of course I missed them, no phones to check beforehand. I also recorded my moans about the Christmas Day food though I am sure my mother would have done her best to find things "couldn't get pork, couldn't get pork pie, beef for Christmas Dinner but no onion gravy". Teatime did not improve "had some strange stuff called chicken and ham, glorified polony." Presents, like food, did not rival present day over-indulgence, Dave gave me 2/6 mother gave me 5/- and Peter gave me a box of chocolates (yes, under wartime rationing! My wife's comment was "yes your mother always did spoil you". On Boxing Day I worked 10 to 4pm and commented "fairly easy day".

My greatest regret about these diaries is that I did not record more detail. For example, I am fairly sure Ernest and his dad would have walked over from Rotherham on Christmas morning, probably not recorded as it was not unusual. If we went to Rotherham in the evening to visit the cinema or theatre we would have to walk home. Only workers on shifts could travel on the trolley buses after 9pm. Even this had its compensations. On clear nights there were millions of stars to be seen in the velvety black sky and we learned to pick out many constellations. On some rarer occasions we were treated to wonderful shooting star displays. On bright nights when the "bombers moon" was out, the stars were less clearly defined, but it was easier to discern the unlit street lights before walking into them.

Many who chance to read this, especially younger people who did not experience these events, will think "how dreadful". In truth it was not, and not because I am looking back through rose coloured spectacles. By and large and certainly among people we knew everybody was in a similar situation. Even then, as now, you could always be aware of others in a worse situation than yours.

Community

On October 17th the Bishop of Sheffield came to the outermost southern part of his diocese. The occasion was an ecumenical service at King Ecgbert's school. For many it was the first opportunity to hear him speak as he is relatively new to the area. Few would have been disappointed.

His message was about community – a topic very close to what the Totley Independent is all about. There are many types of community of course such as churches, schools, interest groups, neighbours, families and so on. What do we mean by "community"? Clearly it means some sort of gathering of people but not all gatherings promote the interests of those who are not in the immediate grouping. Some gatherings are very much orientated towards the benefits of their members. The communities which look outwards and offer care and support for those outside their membership are the sort of communities which are most welcome and deserve encouragement.

Whatever else people gained from this visit, some of us have seen the importance of building up community wherever we can. This does not necessarily mean joining a club or organisation although in this area we are fortunate to have several good groupings which would welcome more support. The immediate message is that we should realise the potential of building better relationships with whoever we meet in our daily lives. This means people at work, in the shops, on the buses, in the street or wherever we meet. There can be a real sense of community between even two or three people.

This is a challenge to the churches because they are so often perceived as a large (or small) group of people doing their own thing whatever that may be. The real gospel imperative however is that we have a personal responsibility in the way we care for others – in other words that we should be building community wherever we are. This challenge is personal to everyone. The challenge is to those who have no Christian faith as well as those who are committed. No one can live in isolation.

We do need our neighbours – they are all "our community". Thank you, Bishop Steven! Maurice Snowdon.

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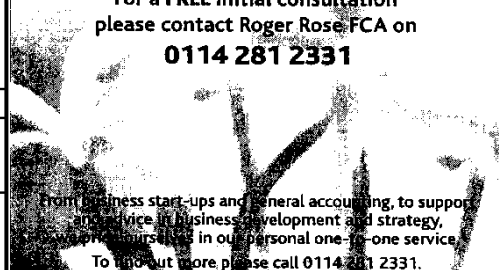
